The children and staff were looking forward to sharing the amazing outcomes at Open Afternoon.


The children worked so hard and it is shame you didn't get a chance to see them in person.

# $MAP \ 18 - \text{cold harbour, lincolnshire}$

Place names are a remnant of the past, revealing a history that has otherwise been forgotten or lost in the mists of time. Cold Harbour is thought to refer to abandoned settlements or dwellings used as refuges by travellers in Anglo-Saxon times. A handful of Cold Harbour names remain around the country as modern place names. This one near Grantham certainly supports the idea, with the important London to York 'Old North Road' running through it. While the Roman name for this road is not known, it is called Ermin Street ('Earninga Straete' in Old English) after the Earningas tribe.


