
4SF– Steffan d - T





MAP 1 — 1801 GENERAL SURVEY OF KENT

It was the military's need to 'see what was over the next hill' and to plan defensive positions or outflank the enemy that ultimately gave us the modern map. This 1801 map of Kent, produced by the Board of Ordnance, became the first map of Ordnance Survey. This 'General Survey of England and Wales - An entirely new and accurate Survey of the County of Kent' - as inscribed into the corner of the map - was produced first because of fears of a French invasion. The small extract of the map shows the North Downs above Seven Oaks (now Sevenoaks). Hachures (the hairy hills) were used to indicate slopes. Spot heights and contours only came into use on OS maps of Ireland in the 1830s and in Britain after the determination of mean sea level at Liverpool in 1844.
