$MAP \, 35 - \text{space age relic still delivering}$

Goonhilly Earth Station, the Lizard, Cornwall

The satellite ground station at Goonhilly was located here, partly because the Lizard is one of the most southerly points on mainland Britain, but also to tie into the underwater communication cables, laid before the space age, that come ashore nearby. Twentythree of the dish antennas are currently active, including No. 1 'Arthur'. Built in 1962, it was used to carry the first ever transatlantic pictures form the USA to Europe via the Telstar satellite. Nearby is a Neolithic standing stone, so people have been looking up from here for a very long time.
