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Message from Mr Reid

I hope you had a **good half term holiday** and spent plenty of time outside enjoying the wonderful weather.

It has been fantastic to welcome back Year 6 children and Key Worker children this week. On Monday morning we had 84 Year 6 children arrive, all strictly following the staggered start time. It has been a highly successful first week and this is down to the children and staff adapting brilliantly to the new conditions and restrictions. The children have arrived with enthusiasm and really enjoyed seeing their friends again.

The proposed plan has so far been successful when put into practice. Children have adapted well to working within a smaller

class, shortened school day and playing within their zone at break time and lunchtime. Some have even said they prefer this version of school!







Years 3, 4 and 5 continue to follow Google Classroom and engagement is generally very high. Like anything in life, the more you put in, the more you get. I have observed some wonderful dialogues between children, parents and teachers enabling feedback and support. An interesting

recent article I read, stated that as **restrictions begin to ease** and there are more opportunities for families to access outside of the home, interest in home schooling may start to diminish. I would encourage you to **keep your children engaged with a regular daily routine**. Once a routine is lost it can be hard to reestablish. Many families find that they are able to have a productive morning and then enjoy other activities in the afternoon.

Regarding the return to school of Years 3, 4 and 5, there has been no recent update from the DfE. I don't get any advance warning and read the news like you to try to find out what might be changing in the future. Press speculation regarding

a return of all pupils in July seems to have gone quiet but this doesn't mean there couldn't be a government announcement. We are currently right on the cusp of pupil and staff capacity under the current protective measures that schools have to follow. Until class sizes are restored to 32 pupils I am struggling to see a way forward. If I receive any updates I will let you know.

YEAR 5 PARENT CONSULTATIONS

As mentioned in the previous newsletter we will be providing Year 5 parents with a consultation. Traditionally this consultation is help you make an informed choice whether to enter your child for the Kent Test.

Under the current circumstances, with such little contact between home and school, even if you are not entering your child for the Kent Test you are welcome to book a consultation.



We have decided that the **format of the consultation will be a telephone call**. We will continue use School Interviews as the booking system. Further details will be sent to Year 5 parents at the beginning of next week.

The consultations will take place on Wednesday 17th and Thursday 18th June. They will still be ten minutes long, and strict time keeping will be essential!

Please be aware teachers will not have as much information this year due to not having taught your child since March and also not having June assessment data. Most children did complete an NFER assessment just before school closure in March and an assessment in December. However, we often see a pattern of their June assessment being higher than their March score. This is not unusual so please do not be alarmed if your child's March score is lower than their end of Year 4 June assessment!

The **Year 5 teachers will do their best to provide some insight** to which type of school your child will be best suited to and where they will thrive academically, socially and emotionally.

Ultimately it is you as parents who decide whether your child sits the test and we are always supportive of all decisions taken.

Registration for the Kent Test will proceed as normal between 1st June - 1st July. Please go to <u>KENT TEST REGISTRATION</u> to register you child for the Kent Test.



MAP 6 — HOLDING BACK THE SEA

Thames Barrier, London

The Thames Barrier spans 520 metres and prevents the floodplain of most of Greater London (around 125 square kilometres) from being inundated by exceptionally high tides and dangerous storm surges moving up from the North Sea. It has been operational since 1984 and has been closed (raised) almost 200 times to protect against tidal flooding and for combined tidal/fluvial events. The barrier consists of ten steel gates with the main gates standing as high as a five-storey building when raised.
