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Message from Mr Reid

I hope you have had a successful week and enjoyed/survived the change in temperature!

As mentioned in last week's newsletter we have been trialling Google Meets to enable remote meetings between teachers and their classes. We discovered a major glitch around teachers not being able to end the meetings successfully so have therefore decided to use **Zoom** instead.



If your child is in Years 3, 4 and 5 you will have been sent a **letter** today regarding protocols for using Zoom. We will use the Google Classroom platform to share the meeting link which will appear on your child's stream. This will be a recurring meeting for the last three weeks of term.

Please don't worry if your child misses their first meeting due to a technical issue or not remembering to join the meeting. It might be a good idea to join the meeting a few minutes before to ensure cameras and microphones are working.

TRANSITION

On **Monday 29th June** you will receive my Headteacher's Letter for the summer term. As usual this will **contain details of who your child's teacher will be next year**. If the Zoom meetings go well next week, we will be able to use this platform to complete transition meetings in small groups with your child's new teacher.

During the last week of term we are going to ask all children to upload a piece of work about themselves for their new teacher to view and comment on via Google Classroom. This will include setting up a Google Classroom for Year 2 pupils for that week so they can also share a piece of work and begin to feel part of Amherst.

Monday 29th June is also the day all information will be sent to our new Year 3 parents. Our induction talk and tour has been replaced by a video tour and video of my talk. This will be placed on the school website.

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As referenced in last week's newsletter letter, I predict the last few weeks of term could be quite **difficult as restrictions in school become stricter** than wider society. It must be **confusing for a child** why they can go to a packed beach on a hot day with their family but at school are kept in a strict social bubble!

Please can I ask that if your child is attending school that you continue to be respectful and mindful of the social distancing rules in place outside of school. As much as we want to move life forward we do not want lockdown to be imposed again. KCC have today released a statement that schools must continue to follow the guidance given linked to schools reopening on 1st June. The statement included the following:


We are aware that a number of schools plan to offer provision in a way that does not accord with the current guidance. This includes:

- Ending of term early to offset the time that schools remained open at half term and Faster
- Holding of sports days
- Rota-ing of pupils
- Shortening the term for some year groups to offer two weeks for pupils not currently in school to attend for a fortnight
- Pupils joining the school in Year R in September attending school this term
- Planning now for a delayed start to Term 1 in September, either for the whole school or individual year groups

It is absolutely understandable that schools wish to explore all opportunities for as many children to attend school this term as possible, especially as the hard work of schools has meant that the wider opening this month went well and confidence is high. However, the virus remains in circulation within the community and it is important that the prevailing guidance is followed today for the protection of staff, children and society.



Radcliffe Road, Nottingham

This unassuming stretch of road in Nottingham, Radcliffe Road, was the first tarmac road in the world. Tarmac was invented after an accidental spillage of tar was covered with waste slag from a nearby furnace by locals attempting to deal with the sticky mess. County surveyor for Nottinghamshire, Edgar Hooley, happened to be walking in Denby in 1901 and cam across the spillage site. Being, in a position to develop and perfect a heated mix of tar, slag and stone chips, he began transforming road surfaces, starting with a five-mile stretch of Radcliffe Road.
