Message from Mr Reid

Firstly, I would like to update you on our plans for all children to return full time in September and timeline of communication.

You will have received an email yesterday providing details about the **Zoom transition meetings** that are taking place next week. If you have not yet read the email please remember:

We have arranged Zoom transition meetings for your child to meet their new teacher next week. We will continue to use the smaller groups already created.

Please could your child prepare in advance to have an object, picture or photo to share with the group that tells their new teacher something interesting about them. This could be a hobby, interest, experience or about their family.



Mansion Impossible


The Escape Room took place last week and the feedback was that the children thorougly enjoyed themselves.

184 participants took part and thankfully, everyone escaped!!!



The Central Meridian

In 1936 the Ordnance Survey moved from county-based mapping with their local Cassini projections to a single Transvers Mercator projection covering the whole of Great Britain. This gave us continuous mapping across county and country borders and allowed for the introduction of a 'national grid'. To get a spherical Earth onto flat paper a projection is used. The central meridian runs straight up along the 2 west longitude and is seen here coincident with the 00 eastings at Berwick. To avoid negative grid figures, the true origin of the projection was moved to create a 'false' origin for the national grid to the west and south of the Isles of Scilly.
